But Mico breaks their agreement and chooses Level 9, the hardest level. Lexa can't understand it. When she finds herself, completely unexpectedly, in Level 1, nothing is what it seems. Revolution is brewing in the Towers of Hell. But who is on the right side? And why does Lexa turn out to be so important?
