In 2071, after yet another devastating flood in Brussels, Beth has been forced to flee to Norway with her grandson Tommie and her elderly mother Rosa. Art is no longer valued, so Beth, an artist, has retrained as a shoemaker, in response to a labour market shortage. Her new job takes her to the Lofoten Islands. The reception by the Norwegian system is correct but far from friendly. Tommie is terrified of water and the workshop is close to the sea; Rosa grumbles about the unfamiliar food; and Beth is waiting desperately for a sign of life from Tommie's parents. But soon they manage to build a small community. Beth receives much-needed help in the shoe workshop from an Egyptian refugee, on whom Tommie's delightful schoolmaster instantly develops a crush, while Rosa falls in love with a towering Norwegian whose woolly hat seems fused to his head.

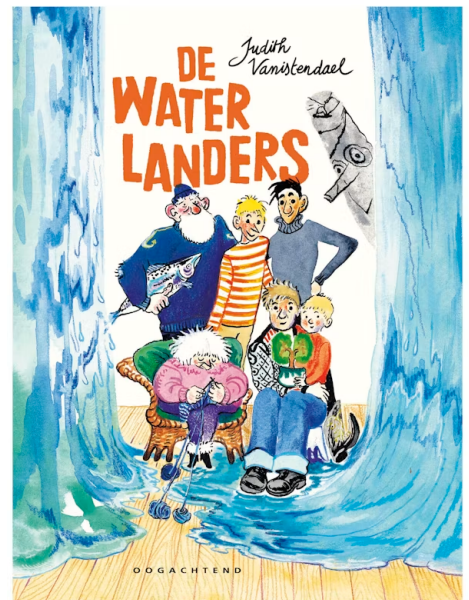
