Grand Central Belge

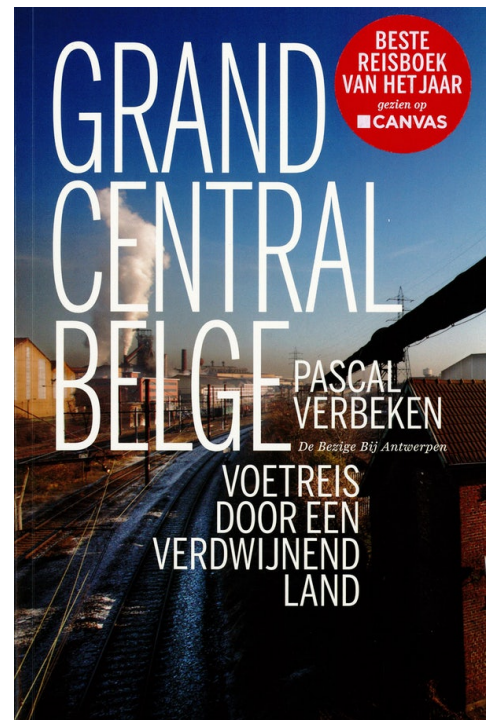
