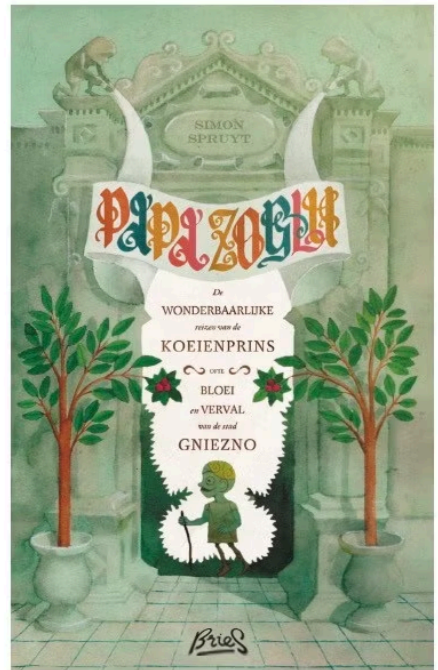
TERRES DE LEGENDE

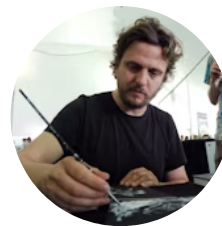
